These survey data were collected for the [Retaining Teacher Talent project](#), conducted by [Public Agenda](#) and [Learning Point Associates](#) to better understand the views of teachers, particularly teachers from Generation Y (e.g., born between 1977-1995), on various policy reform ideas.

Number of participants (N) = 890 public school teachers in continental U.S.

Form split: Form A/Form B - each a random ½ of sample

Interviewing dates: April 16 - June 22, 2009

Mixed mode - telephone and online

SAMPLE SIZE/MARGIN OF ERROR:

890 Total (%) Teachers (plus or minus 4)

241 Gen-Y Teachers ages 18-32 (plus or minus 11)

642 Teachers age 33 or older (plus or minus 5)

The margin of error is higher when only a selected portion of the sample were asked a question item.

SAMPLING TOLERANCE:

Only differences greater than 8 points are likely to be significant when comparing Gen Y (%) teachers to those aged 33 years and older.
